of the comments we hear when going through the interview process prior to a new student or group coming to our program. What continues to astound, amaze, motivate, and create this heartfelt love for what we do is witnessing just the opposite when our students come to Driving Magic, Inc.

Yes, there are therapeutic benefits like enhanced eye/hand coordination, motor planning or spatial and environmental awareness. But I believe it's the freedom, empowerment, and confidence that is experienced

> by our students that makes the difference. Traversing Steadfast Farms to feel the wind, listen to the trees and frogs, stop to pick up an ear of harvested corn, click to the clip-clop of hooves on the

driveway and feel the cadence of each horse

as it moves in walk and trot touches students and volunteers alike. And yes, speed, the natural speed of a horse-drawn carriage, is appealing to many of our students; especially for those whose disability so severely impacts their ability to experience the

world around them. When a student

steps up into the carriage (or rides up the lift), grasps reins (or a noodle or communicator) and commands into action a draft horse who is so powerful yet so docile and loving, something changes...you may catch it subtlety or it

blows you away. And you know that their life and yours will, thankfully, never again be the same.

> So, YES he CAN hold his head up for 15 minutes on a cross-country trail drive, and YES she has become an advanced independent driver, and YES she puts her own helmet on now and YES he can drive, lead, and groom his horse, and YES she does drive on active lines with her feet, and YES she turned that 1800 pound horse in the direction of the handbells to perfectly stay on the obstacle

course and YES there wasn't a dry eye at the farm today!

For those of you who don't know me, I formerly lived in Massachusetts where I owned and drove each of my two Morgan horses. For 5 years, my horse, trainer and I competed in the Morgan horse show circuit throughout New England. Although I was the only disabled person competing, all of the 16 judges and drivers treated me equally. We won many blue ribbons in all classes. Yes, we lost some, just like everyone else, but we won some too. It was a wonderful experience and I missed it sorely when my husband John and I moved to Florida, where, in our particular area, there was no carriage driving. In 2005, John and I moved to Carrollton, Georgia where, once again, there is no carriage driving.

One night while preparing dinner, I saw Wes Sarginson's segment on Driving Magic. When I stopped screaming in excitement, I contacted Jennifer and soon after returned to driving.

Take it from me, driving draft horses is far different from driving Morgans. Even the terminology is different!

The volunteers, AB [able-bodied] drivers and trainers at Driving Magic have all been so kind and patient with me as I am learning how to drive all over again.

As much as I enjoy driving again, something was missing. I didn't own my own horse. Then I learned about the sponsorship program at Driving Magic. I immediately signed up as Heidi's sponsor. Once again, in a limited way, I had adopted a horse. And best of all, now I could give back to this wonderful program that has brought back to me so much.
